

THE CONTRIBUTIONS OF UNREGULATED HEALTHCARE WORKERS TO TEAM DECISION-MAKING IN LONG-TERM CARE

PURPOSE/OBJECTIVES

To explore HCAs' contributions to team decision-making and to assess the feasibility of our qualitative methods to enhance methodological rigor for a larger case study.

FINDINGS/IMPACT/ OUTCOMES

We mapped a preliminary picture of HCAs' decision-making process and contextual factors influencing how they contribute to team decisions. Overall, we found that HCAs were not fully integrated into team decision-making processes and there were breakdowns in the sharing of information about resident care.

CONCLUSIONS

HCAs are the primary caregivers to some of our most frail older citizens, and thus have the potential to make a significant impact on the quality of resident care. Investing in HCAs, the largest workforce in long-term care, is central to advancing quality of care and resident safety in nursing homes.
